Abstract

This years annual conference was held May 24-29,1997 in Minneapolis Minnesota. The event consists of a variety of activities including the annual meetings of :

- The Association of Physician Assistant Programs
- The Association of Postgraduate Physician Assistant Programs

Specialty organizations in occupational medicine, neurosurgery, obstetrics and gynecology, oncology, orthopedic surgery, dermatology, emergency medicine, addiction medicine, otolaryngology, and pediatrics held their annual meetings. In addition, interest group in critical care, geriatric medicine, urology, and nephrology met to discuss possible involvement in the Academy.

Although this may sound like all work and no play, several official social activities were held for attendees and their families. And as always, many unofficial gatherings of old friends and previous classmates were attended to make the trip truly worth the effort.
